#### UPDATE ON HOSTING A FAMILY FROM UKRAINE

On Friday 3rd June, my sister Kristine and I started our "journey" of hosting a family from Ukraine.

Kristine drove to Doncaster Airport to pick up Nina and her two little boys, Misha (6) and Tima (4). The return trip to the Wirral gave us a taster of what was to come, with Tima exhausted and stressed, managing to undo himself from the child seat and clamber over the front seat to sit on his mother's lap. No amount of cajoling would settle him so to the accompaniment of blood curdling screams, Kris drove the family to their new, temporary, home.

With the aid of Google, we managed a few preliminary conversations, set out a few ground rules, gave them a generous amount of personal space and left them to settle in.

The welcome from our friends, neighbours, family and church family, has been truly overwhelming. We have had donations of furniture (chest of drawers, beds and bedding, lamps, hanging rails, wash baskets and even a brand-new sewing machine), we have had parcels of food brought to the door, baskets of toiletries, bikes, scooters and toys for the boys to play with, clothes and shoes for both Nina and the children and all given with unconditional love.

The first 3 weeks, while I was away in Poland, was a whirlwind of form filling, going to various offices, trying to sort out Universal Credit, registering with the GP, trying, unsuccessfully, to find a dentist, meetings with Social Workers, setting up phone contracts, trips to Liverpool to sort out biometric passports . . . and we are still in the midst of all this!

This has not been an easy journey. Nina has left behind her husband and wider family, her home, her friends, her church family and her job. She has arrived at the home of strangers and speaks very basic English. For the first time in her life, she is having to look after 2 small, traumatised children on her own. Tima's behaviour has been particularly challenging for her, and us. After 6 weeks we finally managed to get some support for her and the children from the Children's Centre in Birkenhead, one and a half hours a week for 4 weeks.

Although there are several Support Groups for Ukrainians in the Wirral, Nina has found it difficult to make friends and spends a lot of time on her own. We have had several tearful sessions where she has completely broken down under the strain.

Nina is a committed Christian and belongs to a worldwide evangelical movement. Her faith is very important to her and she spends a lot of time reading the Bible, praying and speaking to her brothers and sisters in Christ on Zoom calls in the evening.

Until this week, Nina has been managing to live on the initial payment given to her by the Government. She was VERY grateful for the donation of £176 which was collected by the members of our URC via the Coffee Mornings and Mid-Week Lunch. Her Universal Credit payments have now started to come through, so she is now able to stand on her own feet financially, but wishes to thank everyone for their generosity.

The future for this family remains very uncertain. Her husband has not been conscripted to fight yet, but this may be a challenge to come.

The children are due to start school at St Saviour's in Oxton in September. Neither of these children have attended school before as children in Ukraine don't usually start school until they are seven. We face some serious challenges ahead as we try to prepare the children for school. Expectations, which we take for granted, such as being able to dress themselves, follow instructions, sit and eat together at a table, play co-operatively together and follow regular waking and bedtime routines, all need to be put in place in a few short weeks.

At the beginning of December, the period of time which Kristine and I agreed to act as Hosts will come to an end and Nina will be trying to move on to her own accommodation. This is likely to be the biggest challenge yet, as social housing is almost impossible to get without a long wait and private landlords are very reluctant to rent to Ukrainians as they are unlikely to pass credit checks, have large deposits saved, or find sponsors willing to stand as guarantors. So, if anyone knows anybody who knows anybody who has a house or flat to rent, please let us know.

On a sunny day last week, I asked Nina what her hopes or dreams for the future were. After a long pause she replied, "I have no hopes or dreams anymore. I am just trying to get through each day".

A few weeks ago, when I led prayers in church, there was not a single prayer request. Can I suggest that you pray every day for . . . Nina and her family, for the peaceful resolution of the war in Ukraine, for hope and dreams to fill Nina's heart again.

# Oh dear! What a dilemma! Should I go on holiday? or should I stay at home?

I wonder if anyone else has ever felt that this question was a problem. I wanted to have a break, but I was very nervous and unsure. So, when friends, Vera and Peter from Exeter, telephoned to say that they had booked a cruise to Norway in June and would I like to join them? I had a decision to make - should I go or should I stay at home?

I had not been away from my home since September 2019 and so many things, in my own life and in the world, had happened since then, but I needed to make that decision.

I was tempted, so I rang my travel agent and asked him about the availability of cabins and his answer was positive. So off I went to see him. My decision was made. I booked to go to Norway for 12 nights on the Queen Mary 2, with Vera and Peter.

Obviously, the conditions and requirements had changed since the outbreak of Covid-19. However, I am fully vaccinated but I also had to have an official negative Rapid Antigen test the day before we sailed, as well as specific insurance cover for Covid.

I travelled down to Southampton the day before we sailed and from my hotel bedroom window on the Sunday morning, I could see the cruise ships, the Queen Mary 2 berthed at the Mayflower Terminal, the Aida on the City Terminal and from the front of the hotel, the Britannia on the Ocean Terminal.

Our ports of call were Hamburg which is 80 miles from the North Sea, up the River Elbe and takes about 6 hours to transit. Hamburg has a splendid City Hall.

Ålesund which was our closest port to the Arctic Circle and is known for its Art Nouveau architecture.

Olden is at the head of the Nordfjord, and known as the Gateway to the Glaciers.


Bergen where the harbour has a well-known fish market and the Bryggen, a row of brightly coloured shops including a Christmas shop which is open all the year round.

Stavanger is the centre of Norway's oil industry with a 12th century Cathedral, and Grieg's Concert Hall in the shape of a grand piano.

Once we reached Ålesund we were in 24-hour daylight and we had only one day when the weather was inclement and another day when the temperature reached 81° Fahrenheit!

From Olden I went on scenic tour to the Jostedal Glacier National Park in Stryn with its mountains, lakes and valleys. The Jostedal Glacier Icefield is more than 60 miles long and is the largest glacier on the European mainland.

The coach driver and our guide were very good and we stopped at "view-points" so that everyone could get off the coach and take photographs. I am not a brilliant photographer but I wanted to share with you the beauty of Norway with its fjords, glacial waters and snow-capped mountains. These are Lake Stryn and the River Stryn.







If you are going on holiday soon, I hope you have a lovely time and that the weather is kind to you. Like me you might have to follow the Covid restrictions but I hope it does not spoil your long-awaited holiday.

#### **GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2022**

Pauline, Heather, and I were part of a delegation from Mersey Synod who attended this year's General Assembly of the United Reformed Church which took place at the Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick, from 8th to 11th July.

It was hoped that this conference would be the first 'in person' since the pandemic but an outbreak of Covid during a Methodist Conference a week earlier meant this would be a hybrid meeting. There were in total 12 people representing Mersey, 10 who made the trip and 2 who joined on Zoom. And the conference was enjoyed by many and endured by others.

The Hayes Conference Centre is set in the beautiful Derbyshire countryside and had everything needed for a comfortable stay and long business sessions.

The Assembly commenced after lunch on Friday afternoon and ended after lunch on Monday. The business sessions started at 9.00 a.m. and concluded at 9.15 p.m. with breaks in the morning and afternoon, and for lunch and dinner.

There was lots of hard work done over the 4 days and some difficult decisions made and Rita Griffiths, Mersey Synod's Clerk is working through those decisions to see how they will affect local congregations. In the meantime, an Assembly Business Digest is available with some of the main points discussed and decisions made.
