

IN THE CROSS OF CHRIST, I GLORY.

When Heather was getting her new hip recently, the grandsons wanted to know if it was a smart hip that could be linked to Wi-Fi, if so, would they be able to control it with voice commands. You can imagine can't you, how young boys might want to control their grandmother; 'Alexa, make grandma get me a biscuit', or 'Alexa, make grandma leave the room when she's telling us off'. How great would it be to have that sort of control over somebody!

This subject sort of became the focus of one of our Lent studies recently when we were discussing the need for the Cross of Christ. The question was asked as to why God introduced free will – you remember he did that by telling Adam and Eve not to eat the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil; why didn't God leave Adam and Eve in their ignorance and under His total control?

There is a simple answer to that question which has a not so simple solution.

Out of love God created us and wanted us to love Him in return, but in order to love God we must have a choice. God wants us to love him not because we're programmed like some computerised smart device, but because it's what we decide to do. That's free will. And in that free will we have a choice to do the things God wants for us to do and what he made us for.

However, just like our parents, grandparents, and a long line of ancestors reaching back to a garden, we have a choice of doing right or wrong by God.

For Adam and Eve their choice led to paradise lost which has been our inheritance since. God though, in His great love, has found a way for us once again to walk with Him in paradise – the Cross of Christ.

Through Jesus' sacrifice, the consequences of our wrong choices have been dealt with by God himself so that we could be restored and for us paradise regained.

As we celebrate Easter – though not with an overindulgence of chocolate I hope – let's thank God for His love for each of us and for the gift of free will that enables us to love Him in return. And let's thank God, who through Jesus Christ, has secured paradise for us once more.

Joyce started attending Prenton URC in 2017, accompanying her sister, Dot, and, along with Dot, became a member in 2019.

Although Joyce was unable to be physically actively involved in the life of the church due to her advanced years, she became an integral part of our church and enriching our fellowship which has become less at her passing. She loved to be in the thick of things and enjoyed a giggle and was always generous in her giving to appeals, especially for Macmillan and the shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child.

Although she had no immediate family of her own, she was very much part of her sister Dot's family and was always included in any family event. And although Joyce and Dot were rarely seen apart, Joyce continued to live independently to the end.

Joyce loved the worship life of our church and enjoyed greatly, church social events when she was able to attend. She enriched the life of our fellowship and, despite her advancing years and health challenges, she rarely complained but was always ready to offer a word of comfort or encouragement.

Joyce was known by her family as Aunty Joy, and that's exactly as I would like to remember her, a joy to our fellowship.

We thank God for Joyce Mann, for the privilege of sharing life with her and the knowledge, that through faith in Christ we will meet again.

After over a year of waiting for surgery I am relieved to be able to tell you that I have had a hip replacement and the change in pain is nothing short of miraculous.

I know I have to face this operation again when I have my other hip replaced but I can face it with confidence.

So, thank you, for your love and prayers, for your cards, messages and flowers and for the gifts of meals to take pressure off Jeff as he cares for me day to day.

The process of recovery lasts some time, 6 weeks of very limited activity and then a build-up back to 'normality'. I look forward to being able to do things that have been difficult for me and taking my full role again. In the meantime, please continue to pray for me for patience and allowing God to use me as I have had so much time physically inactive.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - 2023

At last year's AGM I quoted Jeremiah 29:11, which says, "For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." But sometimes God's plans can appear elusive.

Coming into a new normal after lockdown and struggling with a large deficit in our finances it was difficult to see how the future would pan out for us as a church in the building here in Prenton Road West. This AGM however we sound a more positive note.

True, we still carry a deficit going into 2023, and pressures remain on our finances but, I'm glad to say that we started 2023 with a much reduced deficit. The fellowship responded well to appeals that the freewill offering increased by more than 10% and income from hall lettings almost doubled. There is hope and expectation too, income from hall users will increase and that we will receive some funds from our insurer due to loss of income during lockdown. Thank you for all your efforts in increasing your giving but can I urge you once again to consider giving sacrificially by increasing your regular giving as much as you are able.

We decided to continue worshipping in the hall from November through to May. This of course has helped to reduce our fuel costs, but it would mean that our special services and events such as Remembrance, Christmas, and Easter would not be in the main worship area.

AGMs are an opportunity for us to review our involvement in God's mission here in Prenton and we have much to celebrate and plenty to hope for. The coffee morning on Wednesdays has gone from strength to strength with increased numbers of church members attending and some residents from the local community. This provision was extended into a Warm Space in the autumn and is to be further extended into a Welcome Space beyond the end of the Warm Space initiative. The prayer meeting too is growing and is proving a great time of fellowship, learning and prayer. We have also continued with our Lent groups which it is hoped will continue after Easter as a regular house group.

Since our last AGM in 2022, we have lost one member, Joyce Mann in the last couple of weeks. We thank God for her and the way she enriched our fellowship during the short number of years she was able to be with us.

We have had no marriages or funerals in church, but we have conducted 5 infant blessings.

Inevitably, many in our fellowship are feeling the effects of old age and

illness which keeps them from regular worship, and we pray for God's blessing and healing upon them and all members of our fellowship who are struggling.

I'd like to thank all of those who contribute to the worship life of this fellowship, the elders, our organist, readers, prayers, and worship leaders, especially during those times when they've had to step in at short notice due to the ongoing impact of Covid. And for all those who look towards the maintenance of the buildings. There are some larger maintenance jobs which will need doing but only once our finances are on a more even keel.

I want to thank everyone involved in the life of the church, especially Jean, your Church Secretary, who works tirelessly for this fellowship, and for Pauline, our treasurer, who has thrown herself into the role with great professionalism but also with a strong mission focus. And an eye to the future. I'd also like to thank Margaret Meade who has given Pauline much support and has taken on responsibility for a number of areas of our church finances. I'd also like to thank Carys, and Fred and Anne for their years coordinating the flower fund and hall bookings and for their new replacements, Pam and Sue. Your service is much appreciated despite the hassles you face.

We have continued to support our regular charities; sending over 100 shoeboxes to the third world again through Operation Christmas child, and continuing to support Charles Thompson, MacMillan, Christian Aid and Wirral Foodbank.

I would like to thank everyone involved in the church; your contribution is vital to the life of this church and the purpose of the Gospel.

A big thank you to the gardeners, visitors and those keeping in touch with people on the phone, the cleaners, Magazine editor and article writers, and refreshment providers, and all who help in the setting up and setting down for worship each week. If you think you can help with any of these and don't already have a role within the church's life then please speak with Jean or me.

As we move into the plans God has prepared for us I'd like to remind you of another verse from scripture. This too was one which has been an encouragement to me throughout my call, training, and ministry. It was give to Joshua as he was about to lead the people into the Promised Land. Let this be a verse that helps us plan for the rest of 2023, 'Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go'

A MAN CALLED JESUS


He would be known among his townsmen As a carpenter of wood, And He'd be recognised by children As their friend, so kind and good.
