Dear Friends,

Probably many people do believe that feelings of happiness, peace and joy can be bought over the counter in a shop or on the internet and given in the form of a gift.

People think that happiness comes from receiving the latest "must have" item; joy on receiving a hamper full of delicious goodies; peace from the toiletries which will wash away all your troubles, but will these feelings last?

We are now approaching the most joyous day of the year for Christians. The birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. A baby sent by God to be our Saviour and to show us the way that we should live our lives as followers of his teachings.

This **Gift** from God cannot be bought over the counter in a shop. It is a priceless **gift** that we do have to accept, to know lasting peace, joy and happiness, and it is the most costly of all **God's Gifts** to us.

We know the Christmas story but if you look at it in depth, it is powerful. It is about a baby born in poverty in a stable and as Jesus grew into an adult he was subjected to extreme cruelty. As Christians it teaches us to show compassion for the hungry, the homeless, and the persecuted; the refugees, asylum seekers and the needy, knowing that God is close to them as He is to us and that there is nothing we have to face alone because "God is with us".

When the Christmas celebrations are over, we will return to our normal routine as the Shepherds did in Luke 2:20 "The shepherds went back to work, glorifying and praising God for everything they had heard and seen, which had happened just as they had been told".

Their circumstances were still the same but they were different. We too, if we have truly celebrated Christmas, should be full of praise and we should take the joy of Christmas into our everyday lives.

The Christmas story is also reflected by Charles Dickens in his book, 'A Christmas Carol' where Ebenezer Scrooge changes from a selfish, hard-hearted and tight-fisted man who had a very bad dream, a nightmare, and he changed overnight into someone who treated

others with kindness, and made every effort to spread joy and happiness wherever he went.

Christmas can change every one of us too, making us into more compassionate, loving, generous, kind, joyful and happy people glad to be alive in God's world

CONVERSATIONS WITH GOD

Our November meeting and prayers focused on War and Peace.

We started our session by listening to a piece of music by Karl Jenkins called "The Armed Man". A piece of music dedicated to the victims of the Kosovo crisis.

The Bible has much to say on the subject of war and peace and we read and reflected on some of these passages.

We shared memories of our family members who had been involved in the conflicts of WW1 and WW2 acknowledging the sacrifices and contributions they had made in battle or on the Home Front.

We turned our attentions to the conflicts in Ukraine and in Gaza. We prayed about the Problems, the People and the Peacemakers. If you wish to read these prayers they are displayed on the notice board in the Church Hall along with some images of War.

We ended our session by listening to a very challenging piece of satirical writing by the American author, Mark Twain. This was very thought provoking and needed quiet prayers afterwards. If you are interested to know what he said, the short story is called "The War Prayer". It is a scathing indictment of war, and particularly of blind patriotic fever and religious fervour as motivations for war.

We do not shy away from challenging subject matter in this group. If you are interested and wish to join in with your thoughts and prayers, we meet every 1st Tuesday in the month at Pauline's house, 1 Prospect Road from 1.30 p.m. to 2.30 p.m.

RUDOLF THE RED NOSED REINDEER

As the holiday season of 1938 came to Chicago, Bob May wasn't feeling much comfort or joy. A 34-year-old ad writer for Montgomery Ward, May was exhausted and nearly broke. His wife, Evelyn, was bedridden, and on the losing end of a two-year battle with cancer. This left Bob to look after their four-year-old daughter, Barbara.

One night, Barbara asked her father, "Why isn't my mommy like everybody else's mommy?" As he struggled to answer his daughter's question, Bob remembered the pain of his own childhood. A small, sickly boy, he was constantly picked on and called names, but he wanted to give his daughter hope, and show her that being different was nothing to be ashamed of. More than that, he wanted her to know that he loved her and would always take care of her.

So, he began to spin a tale about a reindeer with a bright red nose who found a special place on Santa's team. Barbara loved the story and made her father tell it every night before bedtime. As he did, it grew more elaborate and because he could not afford to buy his daughter a gift for Christmas, Bob decided to turn the story into a homemade picture book.

In early December, Bob's wife died. Though he was heartbroken, he kept working on the book for his daughter. A few days before

Christmas, he reluctantly attended a company party at Montgomery Ward. His co-workers encouraged him to share the story he'd written. After he read it, there was a standing ovation. Everyone wanted copies of their own. Montgomery Ward bought the rights to the book from their debt-ridden employee.

Over the next six years, at Christmas, they gave away six million copies of Rudolf the Red Nosed Reindeer to shoppers. Every major publishing house in the country was making offers to obtain the book. In an incredible display of goodwill, the head of the department store returned all rights to Bob May. Four years later, Rudolf had made him into a millionaire.



Now remarried with a growing family, May felt blessed by his good fortune. But there was more to come. His brother-in-law, a successful songwriter named Johnny Marks, set the uplifting story to music. The song was pitched to artists from Bing Crosby on down. They all declined. Finally, Marks approached Gene Autry, the cowboy star who had scored a holiday hit with "Here Comes Santa Claus" a few years before. Like the others, Autry wasn't impressed with the song about the misfit reindeer.

Marks begged him to give it a second listen. Autry played it for his wife, Ina. She was so touched by the line "They wouldn't let poor Rudolf play in any reindeer games" that she insisted her husband record the tune. Within a few years, it had become the second best-selling Christmas song ever, right behind "White Christmas". Since then, Rudolf has come to life in TV specials, cartoons, movies, toys, games, colouring books, greetings cards and even a circus act.

The little red-nosed reindeer dreamed up by Bob May and immortalised in song by Johnny Marks has come to symbolise Christmas as much as Santa Claus, evergreen trees and presents.

As the last line says, "He'll go down in history."
