FROM THE MANSE

THE GOOD NEWS OF THE GOSPEL AND THE WORKINGS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

I know that sometimes the routine of being church can often obscure the huge impact the Gospel and the workings of the Holy Spirit can have on the lives of individuals, but I'd like to share three instances that have happened in the last couple of weeks that show how the Holy Spirit works the Good News of Jesus in the lives of people.

I was asked by St. George's school to deliver a number of assemblies introducing the Gospel, so I decided to explain that the Gospel means Good News and in particular, the Good News about Jesus so I shared a story by Max Lucado called 'You are special'. It tells the story of a small wooden people, the Wemmicks, who were made by Eli, the woodcarver. The Wemmicks went about each day giving one another gold stars or grey dots depending on whether they thought the other Wemmicks were good or bad. Ultimately though, it was what Eli thought about each Wemmick that mattered. And because Eli had made each Wemmick, each Wemmick was special to him despite the stars and dots.

After I shared the final assembly, one of the teachers stood up and told the whole school that the day she had been having up to this point had been a bit 'comme ci, comme ca', but after hearing that story about the Wemmicks and the Good News that we are each special to God because He made us, her day was now 'très bien'.

I then got a phone call about a baptism. I get a lot of phone calls from parents asking for baptisms for their children, particularly at Prenton and initially thought it was one such request. So, I asked the person on the other end of the phone how old the child was and explained that I did not normally baptise children and could I come and speak to them.

He then explained to me that the baptism was for him and his partner, and that over the few months they had been together they had been talking about Jesus and the need to have him in their lives. He told me that neither of them or their families had ever gone to church, but they just couldn't stop talking about this need to have Jesus in their lives and they knew baptism was something they needed to do. We had a long conversation which ended in me asking him to talk things over with his partner and to get back to me once they'd thought things through. It made me wonder how the Holy Spirit was working in this couple for them to want Jesus in their lives.

The final incident was following one of the Christianity Explored sessions which happen on Wednesdays at the manse. This particular week we were looking at why Jesus had to die. After we'd finished everyone headed off home and one member of the group shared that as they drove home, they started to cry at the realisation of what Jesus had done for them. And as they drove home they experienced the presence of the Holy Spirit as their body was filled with an overwhelming sensation of complete joy.

I suspect that life for that person will never be quite the same again.

I don't know about you but these stories really encourage me in my own walk with Jesus and give me a renewed desire to share the Good News of Jesus because we can see how lives can be changed.

I hope these stories encourage you too and give you a renewed strength in your faith and maybe the courage to share the Good News on your frontlines.

I look forward to hearing more stories.

TRIBUTE TO AMY MAUREEN MAKIN

7th June 1936 - 18th June 2024

Maureen was born in Wallasey, where she was brought up by loving parents. She remained in Wallasey during the early years of her marriage to Les. They had met during their early teens and enjoyed a long and happy marriage. Maureen never stopped missing him.

Maureen had a long career in the retail sector, working for Boots, Millican's Chemists and George Henry Lee, and it was here that she met Lorraine, who was to become a lifelong friend.

Along with Les, she was a central part of the life of Prenton URC and, for a while took on the role of serving Elder.

When I asked people what they remember of Maureen the same words and phrases kept being repeated: She was feisty, strong willed (or downright stubborn if you like), she was a giggler with a mischievous streak, she wasn't the quickest on the uptake but always saw the funny side of life, and she was just there especially if there was a job to be done.

She was brave and resilient even in her grief following her beloved Les' death, and when she got her cancer diagnosis, she accepted it as a matter of fact and tried to remain positive and wanted to keep going for as long as she could - and she did that, even offering to help with the dishes just a couple of weeks before she died.

Maureen had an overriding sense of duty even when that got her into trouble, but she always sought to love and support her family particularly through some difficult times and for the pride she had in them.

Heather and I remember that Maureen was always there at all the open days we have held at the Manse over the last 14 years.

She was always first in the kitchen to get drinks for others, making people welcome and chatting to everyone as they arrived. We could rely on her to keep people's glasses topped up with pinot or mulled wine, depending on the season!

Maureen was always very generous with little gifts and time. Never wanting to be waited on and wanting to help and look after other people right up to her last few occasions at church.

Not one to be backward in coming forward, Maureen would ask the questions that maybe we all wanted to ask, she was always wanting to be involved, still coming to Christianity Explored until just a few weeks before her death.

Maureen had lost so much weight latterly that, on her way back home from Church, when she got out of the car her trousers fell down! Maureen just stood in the car park laughing but thankfully Elaine was able to recover her dignity!

We will truly miss Maureen who has been a constant supporter throughout all our time at Prenton and we thank God for her example and influence.

CARING FOR EACH OTHER – BEING GOD FOR EACH OTHER

Did you read in the last magazine what Jeff wrote about prayer cards? I thought I would write this article to remind those who came to church on Sunday July 7th what we are undertaking to do, and it will inform those who were not at church on that day what it is about, so if you come on another day, you can join in.

Everybody was given a folder as they came into church, containing two prayers, two cards, and a blank sheet of paper. During the service, we learned that we can pray over varying times: during a day, for a week and even for a whole month. Firstly, for and with one person – our "prayer buddy" for today. Whatever we say is completely confidential. We are speaking to this one person as if they are God for us. And they are speaking to us as if we are God to them. We said a prayer to each other:

"May God envelop you in the warmth of His love, And place a circle of protection around your life. May He surround you with His loving care And enfold you in His peace – peace within and peace without."

Later in the service, we looked at the first card, on which is written, "During the next week I will pray for" and the name of one church member is on the card. Whoever it is, we will pray for them during this first week, we write their names on our piece of paper, and bring the card back to church, to exchange it for a second one.

The idea is that over a number of weeks, everyone receives cards with different names on, and prays for each person. Finally, if we remember to write down all those names, we will be praying for everyone in our church, including ourselves.

The second card works in a similar way, but it works over a month. The names on the cards are of individuals and groups over the whole world. They may be in foreign countries, they may be workers in this country. All these names or groups are also on display at the back of church, so you can pray for them even though you haven't had the card yet.

When you take a card, please don't rummage in the box until you find the person you like. You will find them given to you over the next few weeks, but there may also be people you find it difficult to like or pray about. They need your prayers too. And at the end of our experiment, we should all be praying by name for everyone else in our fellowship, not just our favourites!

We began this idea on the same day as our Strawberry lunch. I put up some notices with a picture of a strawberry on, and the comment: "A strawberry is a fruit surrounded by all its seeds on the outside, and it should remind us of our church, here we are all together surrounding our fellowship, and caring for each other. In this way we can grow the future of Prenton URC."

What difference do you suppose it will make to our fellowship if we are all praying for each other by name, and knowing specific problems and worries or thanks that we can bring to the Lord on other people's behalf, and each of us knowing also that more than thirty people are praying for us too?
